Basingstoke Canal Canoe Trail

General Information



The Basingstoke Canal runs westwards to Basingstoke from it's



junction with the Wey Navigation, 3 miles from the River Thames. It was conceived in 1769 as an economical means of transport to develop agriculture in central Hampshire. The canal never really proved profitable and by the 1960s it was no longer navigable. In the 1970s Surrey and Hampshire County councils took the canal into public ownership and funded a programme of restoration supported by voluntary working parties. In 1990 work was completed and the canal formally reopened in 1991.

An attractive waterway, the Basingstoke Canal is also a notable wildlife habitat. It has one of the largest varieties of aquatic plants and invertebrates in the UK. 25 of Britain's 39 species of dragonflies and damselflies inhabit the canal. The entire length except for a bit through Woking is a Site of Special scientific Interest (SSSI). Greywell tunnel which marks the end of the navigable section is an internationally important haven for bats.

It is a delightful canal to canoe on as parts of it feel quite remote. It is also an ideal canal to combine cycling and canoeing ... one party one the water and another party on the bank. The choice as to where to go on the canal is yours there are some access points and mileage set out for your information.
